UNDERSTANDING THE CHRONOLOGY AND STRUCTURE OF THE OLD TESTAMENT (TANAKH): For a purely chronological understanding of the Old Testament (Tanakh), simply read eleven ordinal books. The concurrent books, as listed, were either written in and/or cover material during the same timeframes. To rightly divide the prophetic books, note both their assigned timeframes and geographic locales.

Excursus external to the Kingdoms of Israel and Judah Prophets sent to the Gentile powers during the time of 2 Kings:

- 1. Obadiah (Sent to Edom, descendants of Esau, who allied w/Babylon, judgment pronounced)
- 2. Jonah (1st prophet sent to repentant Ninevah, capital of Assyria, judgment temporarily averted)
- 3. Nahum (2nd prophet sent to defiant Ninevah, capital of Assyria, judgment pronounced)
